My Skills USA experience

TO CATEGORIZE SKILLSUSA AS AN EXPERIENCE LIKE NO OTHER IS AN UNDERSTATEMENT...



I myself participated in the Job Demonstration category. There are so many opportunities that SkillsUSA offers. It's actually insane. From Job interviews to designing a simple pin, the categories feel almost infinite. By sharing my experience, I hope to inspire others to try to compete next year. Mr. Hart and Mrs. Kelliher made the experience as great as it possibly could be. I implore you to try it, I don't regret it. I remember interviewing last year's State Finalist who placed first with the opportunity to compete at nationals and telling them; "I could never." Skills was something I saw my trade peers doing, I never could have imagined I would have had the opportunity to experience it. When I first heard about Skills, I imagined this heated competition where everyone was going head to head to show they were the best in their trade. In reality, it's a lot more than that.



With the Job Demonstration category, you yourself can choose what you would like to demonstrate to the judges at regionals involving your trade skills. I myself chose to demonstrate the functionality of fuel injectors as well as demonstrate the digital wave length of the fuel injector as it opens and closes using a ground side switch circuit. My first poster was not as presentable as I hoped it would be. But I was still happy to participate.



Unfortunately, my circuit had a mishap and I was unable to properly demonstrate the wave length. I was praying that my presentation was enough to wow the judges. Instead of panicking, I did the best thing I knew how to do; work around the problem. I was able to waste about 15 seconds of my time before I decided to divert the mistake with, Well, in the circumstances that the tool is operable, you would see...

Regionals was actually nerve wrecking, especially for someone who had never been in Skills. I remember sitting with my friends with a knot in my stomach not knowing what would happen, how many judges I would be presenting in front of, trying to piece my speech together. The moment we were told to report to whatever room we were competing in, my nerves sky rocketed further than I knew they even could. Luckily, the demonstration was private.

You had 3 minutes to set up your presentation, and 5 minutes to speak. No more than 6 minutes or you were penalized. Those who competed with me for Skills managed to strategize a plan. Christian Mastrianni decided that he would go first to inform us of what to expect. From there, everyone who followed soon after did the same. Two judges were present and I felt myself ease a little once I stepped inside.



That's the only thing you can do in that situation. Salvage what you can, don't let it show. I mean, I definitely let it show once I left the room but I'm sure you can understand my point. The judges don't care about a failed project, at the end of the day, it's your responsibility. I remember sitting with the rest of the Goodwin competitors as the final ones waited to enter and thinking about how I failed my instructor. I had practiced so many times, I ensured that everything was going to plan, and I failed. I let myself be consumed by one single mistake. But I displayed a skill that is commonly used in my trade. When the problem worsens, find another way to fix it. Regionals concluded with a very intense Uno game and lots of laughs. I knew then that I would keep my optimism very low.

WHEN MRS. KELLIHER BROKE THE NEWS...

that everyone who participated in the regional competition had qualified for State's, I was genuinely shocked. I thought with my bland poster board, failed circuit and overall presentation, I would end my time at Skills with regionals. But I qualified, somehow, and I knew I was going to make the most of it. State's was a little different though.

If you wanted to participate in Skills for regionals, the cost was entirely free. The materials, your category, everything within that was your responsibility of putting together. State's require you to pay a \$70 fee to attend as well as the festivities. I knew that if I was going to pay \$70, I had to make my poster look as great as I possibly could.

I called it my beauty after losing, because that's exactly what I felt I would do. When the freshmen in my shop were asking what I was doing while working on this poster, I told them I wanted to add my girly touch with the glitter, but also make it as beautiful as I could because I wanted to go out with a beautiful poster. My circuit received a lot of love too. I added some labels as well as a wiring diagram to the front of it to give it some pizazz. I was going to do my best with what I had.

And I want to severely thank Mr. Barner for helping me out with my project as well. Without his time and effort, my pieces that he himself printed would have gone without being laminated. And another large thank you to Ms. Kiel for allowing me to bug her as much as I did to cut, piece, and glue everything together. Without the help of my teachers, my project would not have been what it is today. I worked extremely hard to get everything together. My classmate Jose Cruz-Garcia helped me with a rough sketch of the fuel injector shown on my poster. From there, I added depth, color, and dimension to tie it all together. Without him, I wouldn't have had the eye catching piece that so many people loved.

In terms of competing, State's had a lot more organization. We had specific schedules that let us know what time we would be competing. For the first round, I was told I would compete at 12:10 pm. Unfortunately, Skills was running behind schedule. I did not compete in my category until about 1:20-1:30 pm. When entering, the only difference was that I now had to present in front of three judges instead of two. I was a bit nervous so my speech was definitely a little slurred. I tried my best to avoid using filler words such as "um" or "uh." Though let's be honest, a few um's are going to slip no matter what.

My circuit, which was giving me a lot of trouble in the beginning, finally worked. The morning when we arrived at Wilcox, I told myself to check the circuit. When I did, my tool did not want to turn on. All I could do was pray that it would magically be fixed after Taylor Mendez, Jose Cruz-Garcia, and Mason Wood tried their best to help me fix the issue. And it did. During my first round, it worked wonderfully. Though I left a little shaken and with little to no hope of making it to finals, I was content with my performance. I knew that when I lost, I would have done the best I could have done. I returned to the cafeteria to have some fun playing Uno, with my DS, and even battleship while the DJ played music I had genuinely forgotten about. I was having the time of my life until Mrs. Kelliher had informed me that I was one of three finalists from Goodwin in my category.

Given that we were so exhausted from being up so early, I found myself having a little trouble enjoying it. We had to be up and at school by 6 am, who in their right mind would have energy to party, let's be honest.

The event was overall fun. When my name was called as one of the official finalists, I knew not to get my hopes up. I had tried my best and that was all that mattered. So.. when I heard...

I was both shocked and overjoyed. My first year competing in skills and I had managed to place third. I could only imagine what I could have placed had I just participated in Skills in my earlier years at Godwin. I worked very hard, and humility got me there.

I also have to thank my wonderful instructors, without them, none of my efforts could have been possible. They're the best teachers anyone could ask for really. And I know everyone has their bias towards their shop teachers, but I can in confidence say that both of my instructors are the kindest, inspiring, and hilarious individuals you will ever meet. They will never allow you to fail, they will never let you give up. Mr. Fluckiger and Mr. Johnson are genuine souls that I know when graduation comes, a little piece of me is going to wither away. They make shop enjoyable; I would have never thought that I would be looking forward to shop every day of academics.
